Nature in Focus

Haute-Garonne is made for sustainable tourism. This is a place for slow travel, where it makes sense to take your time and let nature reveal its many treasures.

The Pyrenees, the undulating countryside of the Lauragais, the green hills of the Comminges, the banks of the Garonne, Pays Tolosan and the stunning scenery around Volvestre. Haute-Garonne has it all.

Le Routard published Haute-Garonne Destination Nature in 2023, a guidebook dedicated to sustainable tourism in every corner of the region. The climate emergency means we must all think about our impact on the environment, and make changes to how we live and how we travel.

Today, tourism needs to be sustainable, and it needs to support local organisations and develop local networks. That way, we can ensure Haute-Garonne is a destination that looks after its environment and nurtures its biodiversity.

Visitors are more demanding than ever, and I want to exceed their expectations. That's why I am committed to progress, and to getting our approach just right.

So, head away from the beaten track and begin your journey in Haute-Garonne; you'll be enchanted.









Toulouse is a cultural, historic and scientific hub, and the festive capital of the southwest of France. The city stands at the crossroads of countless cycling and hiking trails, and on the banks of the mighty Garonne and the peaceful Canal du Midi, which flow through the centre of the city. Explore the region by foot, bike or boat, or head for the giddy heights of the Haute-Garonne Pyrenees. Visit the exceptional Saint-Bertrand-de-Comminges and Valcabrère, on the Way of St James, and the vineyards of Fronton. There is so much to discover in this bewitching part of France, midway between the Atlantic and the Mediterranean.

The Canal du Midi in the Lauragais

Follow the Canal du Midi on foot, by bike or by boat. This jewel of southwest France is a Unesco World Heritage site and an engineering masterpiece, punctuated with engineering structures and constructions as it meanders through the bucolic countryside of the Lauragais. Part of the Canal des Deux Mers, linking the Mediterranean to the Atlantic, this section stretches from Toulouse to Sete. The manmade lake at Saint-Ferréol in Revel is home to Le Réservoir, a museum dedicated to the Canal du Midi, its origins and its 17th century creator, Pierre-Paul Riquet.

The Garonne

After making its way across the Pyrenees in the legendary Trou du Toro chasm and waterfall in Spain, this great river flows through Haute-Garonne from south to north. Slow and calm in some stretches, the Garonne boasts an incredible biodiversity, and is home to a Natura 2000 conservation site. But it has its tumultuous side, too, attracting plenty of adrenaline-seeking visitors who come for white water rafting and kayaking over the rapids. And there's a stunning Regional Nature Reserve at the confluence of the Garonne and Ariège rivers, where alluvial forests flourish and birdwatchers can spot wagtails and sterns, or the blue flash of a kingfisher darting over the water.

Toulouse

Exuberant and fun, laidback and romantic, Toulouse can be whatever you want it to be. The country's aerospace hub and gastronomic capital of the southwest has *art de vivre* completely nailed. Wander through the old town, a designated Remarkable Heritage Site, with its warm, flamboyant colours, stroll along the banks of the Garonne at Place de la Daurade or Port Viguerie, or through the many parks, the Jardin des Plantes or the Jardin Japonais, the riverside Prairie des Filtres or the left bank's peaceful Jardin Raymond VI.

Saint-Bertrand-de-Comminges and Valcabrère

Saint-Bertrand-de-Comminges and Valcabrère boast an impressive heritage. The cathedral of Sainte-Marie and the Saint-Just-de-Valcabrère basilica are listed by Unesco as key stages on the Way of St James. Set against the backdrop of the Pyrenean foothills, this is the starting point for many walks and hikes. Join the GR® 861-Via Garona, the GR® 78-Voie du Piémont or the cycle trail along the Garonne.

The Pyrenees

From the foothills to the summits, the Haute-Garonne Pyrenees welcome hikers, mountain bikers, cyclists, skiers, white water thrill-seekers and rock climbers. Explore Luchon, Aspet, le Cagire, or Saint-Béat, the gate to the Spanish Val d'Aran. Not forgetting the magnificent mountain lakes of Oô, Espingo, Portillon, Lac Vert and Lac Bleu. The ski resorts of Le Mourtis, Luchon-Superbagnères, Peyragudes and Bourg d'Oueil have plenty to offer in summer and in winter.

The vineyards of Fronton

A historic winegrowing area, the *appellation* of Fronton covers around forty independent winemakers and a cooperative cellar. Here the Negrette, a unique grape variety, creates local wines that are elegant, structured, aromatic and floral. Come for the wine-tasting, short walks or longer hikes through the vines, or to enjoy the festivals. You'll find passionate winemakers, beautiful vineyards and handsome châteaux along Fronton's wine route.

Explore the biggest cave network in France

Revered by speleologists the world over, the Felix Trombe cave network in Arbas is the longest underground network in France, with 117km of tunnels and 57 entrances.

Discover the spectacular underground landscapes, from the Henri Morte cave to the Trou du Vent, or the Pierre chasm. Laurent Maffre from Cocktail Aventure offers introductions to caving and vertical caving taster sessions with instruction on rope techniques. Take a daytrip, or opt for an overnight, underground stay.

Flying high: paragliding in Superbagnères

Ready for take-off? Leaving from the Superbagnères ski resort, 1800m above sea level, take to the skies with a paraglider for unbeatable views of the Pyrenees and the Pic d'Aneto. Feel the thermals, upward currents of air, lift you high above the mountains. Take a seat and fly

with your instructor over peaks with more than 1000m of vertical drop. A few steps are all it takes to launch and to land, and you'll even have your hands free for photos. An exhilarating and unforgettable experience.

'Bellow of the Stag' mountain walks


Join a mountain guide for an original and moving encounter with nature on a 'bellow of the stag' walk. In the autumn months (September to mid-October) the distinctive call of the stag rings out across the mountains as he attempts to attract a mate. The sound is impressive, and so are the stags; these are the largest wild mammals in France, weighing up to 250kg. Follow your guide in the tracks of these majestic animals in the Oeuil valley or near Aspet, and listen out for the deep bellow of the stag.



E-scoot away

Amarok Ride offers an off-road e-scooter adventure in Montclar-de-Comminges. With the e-scooter's powerful but quiet engine, you'll roam across fields and forests on a route to suit your level, led by a professional guide. Amarok Ride has mapped out 200km of trails and knows all the secret paths in this rolling countryside. You can also try a quad or an electric motorbike to explore the countryside between the Garonne and the Ariège.

In training for the Olympic Games

France is hosting the Olympic Games in 2024, and this is the perfect spot to try out some of those Olympic sports - like mountain biking in Aras, archery at Lac de Géry, or canoeing on the Garonne. The French Outdoor Archery Championships take place from 17 to 19 May 2024, with les Archers de Mongiscard and more than 800 competitors. In October 2024, don't miss the Canathlon, on the Canal du Midi, a multisport event including mountain biking, canoeing and running, leaving from the Moulin de Nailloux, and finishing with festivities at Lac de la Thésauque.

The Reservoir, Canal du Midi museum located at Saint-Ferréol lake in Revel, invites you to discover its underground gallery (reopening in April 2024): La Galerie des Robinets, highlighted with light and sound for a magical visit.

Nature, fresh air and a chance to get away. Ecotourism is at the forefront of our offering in Haute-Garonne, where forests flourish, gardens grow and gites and chambres d'hôtes invite you to stay a while and enjoy it all. Switch off and relax into eco-friendly travel. Forget the car, travel sustainably and get back to nature in these calm, quiet corners of Haute-Garonne.



Nature and forest

Take a deep breath and relax in the forests of Haute-Garonne. There's the Fôret de Bouconne, in Montaigut-sur-Save, the forests of Cierp-Gaud and Vallée du Ger, near Sengouagnet, on the Spanish border, as well as the Fôret de Montbrun-Bocage in the Volvestre area, or the Jouéou arboretum in Bagnères-de-Luchon. Guided tours and workshops let you follow animal tracks, identify bird calls or learn to cook with wild plants. Try out sports at the forest activity

centres, wander along walking trails or power along mountain bike tracks. These spaces provide a precious refuge for wildlife, too; you may see warblers in the trees and hawks hovering overhead, or catch sight of squirrels, wild boar and deer. At the heart of the Buzet-sur-Tarn Forest, you'll find the Maison de la Biodiversité, with free entry to all. In Haute-Garonne, you'll discover wild woodland spots at the Gorges de la Save, in the north of the Comminges.





On the water at Saint-Ferréol

Motor-free activities, on or off the water, provide plenty of fun at Lac de Saint-Ferréol's La Calypso sport and leisure space. Watersports fans can rent a pedalo, paddleboard, canoe or wing foil, while landlubbers can explore the century-old pine forests on an electric or standard mountain bike. There's beach volleyball, football or badminton in the sports zone. Once you've built up an appetite, settle in at the lakeside restaurant, Les Ondines, for brunch or oysters.

The route to wellness

Haute-Garonne has two thermal resorts ready to welcome you, in Luchon and in Salies-du-Salat.

As well as classic thermal treatments, there are dedicated wellness and stress-relieving cures, as well as a jacuzzi, sauna, hammam and massages. The Salinea spa is in the centre of the spa town of Salies-du-Salat, unusual because of its saltwater springs.







The La Mouline gite in Cintegabelle

La Mouline is just 40km south of Toulouse. Once a watermill, now a gite, this historic building stands at the heart of the superb parklands of the Domaine de Secourieu in Cintegabelle. The gite offers complete comfort, with cool shady terraces, a private Nordic bath, massages and more. The gardens are listed as historic monuments and are home to a very special giant plane tree, classified as a 'remarkable tree' by special French commission. Take a guided tour with Dominique Espagno to find

Leave a lighter footprint

Join the hiking trails and activity spots using the extensive bus and rail network, and leave the car behind. A few ideas:

- The Confluence Garonne-Ariège nature reserve is accessible by bus. Hop off at Portet-sur-Garonne and take the ferry (check travel times and dates before you go).
- · Pibrac station, take the 'Sur les pas des pèlerins' (in the footsteps of pilgrims) hiking trail.
- Muret station: start of the Garonne et Panoramas hike; visit the Musée de Clément Ader et les Grands Hommes, a 10-minute walk.
- Longages Noé station : the Sabatouse watersports centre, a 20-minute walk.
- Carbonne station: start of the Trans-Garona cycle path to the border of Spain.

- · Auterive station: Auterive Adventure, the treetop adventure course, a 20-minute walk.
- · Martres-Tolosane station : Musée de la Faïence, ceramics museum, a 10-minute walk.
- Saint-Gaudens station: The Centre d'Art Contemporain (in the Saint-Jacques chapel) less than a 20-minute walk.
- Montréjeau Gourdan-Polignan station: Aquaparc Comminges, 20-minute walk.
- · Castelnau-d'Estrétefonds: starting point for the Balade entre les vignes (walk among the vines).
- · Luchon station (take the SNCF bus from Montréjeau station): in summer, shuttle busses to the Vallée d'Oô; summer and winter, cable car access to the Luchon-Superbagnères ski resort.

- · Venerque Le Vernet station: kayak with Venerque Eaux Vives, less than a 20-minute walk.
- · Toulouse Matabiau station: direct access to the city centre.
- Toulouse Montaudran: La Halle de la Machine et L'Envol des Pionniers, 10-minute walk.

Venerque: hiking trail accessible by train

Less than 30 minutes from Toulouse, take the train to Venerque to join the new Passerelles entre Rives et Balcons hiking trail (5.3km, 1h30). This trail crosses the Pech plateau, as well as woodlands, communal gardens and the centre of the village. Take in the incredible panorama of the Pyrenees and the Ariège valley, and look out for wild orchids along the way.

Gardens & châteaux tips (1)

Haute-Garonne has an impressive natural, architectural and historical heritage, and is home to numerous châteaux and gardens. The Château de Laréole, jewel of the renaissance, boasts formal gardens and a nature trail through an ornamental park that is home to a number of protected plant species, an orchard and vines. The Château de Bonrepos Riquet, with its orangery and historic structures, such as the grotto and the icehouse dating back to the 17th century. You can also see the experimental basins used by Pierre-Paul Riquet in 1655 as he explored ways to feed water

into the future Canal du Midi. From the feudal castle of Montespan, of which only the keep and a tower and remnants of the crenelated ramparts remain, take in the spectacular views of the plains of the Garonne and the Pyrenees. And visit the curious gardens of the Château de Merville, home to the largest hedge maze in Europe; or the Château de Valmirande in Montréjeau, where you'll find an arboretum, chapel and stables, all listed as historical monuments. Finally, the botanical gardens, A Fleur de Montagne, in Melles, with more than 1,200 species of Pyrenean plants.



A night in the château Château de Jean is a gite 15km north west Toulouse. Set in a château that was destroyed and then rebuilt in the 16th century, it is steeped in history and comes complete with a pool, private terrace, barbecue and walking trails around the 25-acre grounds.

Le château Lamothe A luxury guesthouse in Baziège, in the heart of the Lauragais, this château dates back to 1720 and has a number of guestrooms, a suite and an apartment. There's a pool, jacuzzi, boules pitch, as well as a gym and games room. The gite also serves meals to guests.

Le Domaine d'Escons

Le Domaine d'Escons welcomes guests in a beautifully renovated 18th-century farmhouse in the working forest of Saint-Sulpice-sur-Lèze, 40km south of Toulouse. This farmstay comes with table d'hôtes meals, a relaxation area with pool, boules pitch, and bicycles for guests, as well as an organic mushroom patch, vegetable garden, fig trees, chickens, and sheep. Not forgetting Taïga, the great Pyrenean patou dog.

Bioclimatic house

La Joline, a wooden gite in Montastruc-de-Salies, a bioclimatic, ethical and ecological building, designed to limit energy consumption, offers uninterrupted views of the Pyrenees. Reservation is via Haute-Garonne Tourisme.

Dolce et Cabane

Sleep in a treehouse, 5m off the ground, in Bérat. There's a jacuzzi, sauna and hammock. A unique and luxurious place to stay.



In the trees

A beautiful, modern house built among the ash, oaks and weeping willows, this gite offers guests every comfort, with a pool, Nordic bath, terrace, air-conditioning, a wide screen TV, games and a woodburning stove.

Gîte Le Cabanon

A romantic hideaway to the south of Toulouse. Stay in a little private house on the grounds of the Tarda property in Mauressac, near Auterive, with its wooded garden, saltwater pool and boules pitch.

Le Lauraguel

This gite and guesthouse in Mourvilles-Hautes, close to Revel, is right in the middle of the Lauragais countryside, with a pool, beautiful winter garden and heaps of comfortable, rustic charm around the open fire

Toulouse is the beating heart of the southwest; a natural, cultural, gastronomic, scientific and economic hub and is quite literally at the crossroads of countless hiking trails and cycle paths. Awarded Unesco City of Music status in 2023, Toulouse will mark the 20th anniversary of the death of Claude Nougaro, one of its famous sons, in 2024.

Up in the air

The aerospace capital of the world, Toulouse

has long been at the forefront of the industry. The invention of the first aircraft, attributed to Clément Ader at the end of the 19th century, the planes built by Pierre-Georges Latéocoère in his factory in Montaudran, and by Emile Dewoitine, the epic saga of the Aeropostale airline and the birth of Airbus, have all put it firmly on the map. Explore its impressive history at the Envol des Pionniers museum in Toulouse and the Aeroscopia museum at Blagnac, where you can admire a collection of planes on the tarmac and climb aboard Concorde. For the secrets of outer space, head to the Cité de l'Espace.



A feast of culture

A city of festivals, culture and the arts, Toulouse is home to some important museums and exhibition spaces: the Fondation Bemberg in the Hôtel d'Assézat (reopens February 2024); the Museum les Abattoirs, le Château d'Eau; the Musée des Augustins (reopening partially this summer, and full reopening planned for Autumn 2025), and the Dôme de la Grave, which has been transformed into a cultural space.

Just a few of the events to look out for: the 'Double Je' exhibition on artificial intelligence will open at the Quai des Savoirs on 3 February 2024; "Cathares: Toulouse dans la croisade" opens at the Musée Saint-Raymond and the Couvent des Jacobins from 5 April 2024 to 5 January 2025. "Spirou in the torment of the Shoah," an exhibition that explores the Shoah through the pages of a comic book, will be at the Musée départemental de la Résistance et de la Déportation until 2 March 2024.


The Halle aux Grains, Zénith, Cinémathèque, Opéra National du Capitole, Halle de la Machine and Bikini provide venues for music, the performing arts, theatre, dance, and circus arts.

Among the architectural riches of Toulouse, don't miss the Capitole, a working City Hall, where you can visit the sumptuous Salle des Illustres (free entry).



LuneXplorer at the Cité de l'Espace

A realistic immersive experience, unique in Europe, the LuneXplorer opened in November 2023 at the Cité de l'Espace. Experience a moon mission as though you were an astronaut, feeling the phases of acceleration, take-off and landing on the moon from inside your space capsule.





The new What Opera of the Machines



From 25 to 27 October 2024, La Machine returns to Toulouse city centre with a new show. The outdoor performance follows the success of the first opus, "Le Gardien du Temple," in 2018, which was watched by 900,000 people across the city over four days. This new urban opera, "La Porte des Ténèbres" (The Dark Portal), again stars Asterion the Minotaur. Expect to be astonished as this outsized spectacle takes over the streets once more



La Tour du Capitole

Spend a night in the tower of a historic building, right in the bustling centre of Toulouse. Tucked away in the pedestrian quarter, a stone's throw from Place du Capitole, this three-floor circular apartment has all the charm of Toulouse brickwork and is accessed by a stone spiral staircase with 110 steps. With uninterrupted views across the city's rooftops, it's a cosy, unusual and romantic place to stay.

THE PASSING OF THE OLYMPIC TORCH

Once ignited in Greece, the Olympic torch will embark on a journey around France, ending in Paris for the start of the Olympic Games. The torch will pass through Toulouse on 17 May 2024.

Parks and recreation

Find nature in the heart of the city on a walk through Toulouse's parks and gardens. The Jardin des Plantes, Jardin du Grand Rond and Jardin Royal, all connected by footbridges, make a beautiful triptych. For something a little different, try the parc de l'Observatoire on the heights at Jolimont, the Jardin Japonais at Compans Caffarelli, the Coulée Verte trail at Amidonniers, the Jardin Raymond VI in Saint-Cyprien, the Jardins du Muséum at Borderouge (parc de la Maourine), the park de la Reynerie or Prairie des Filtres on the banks of the Garonne. On sunny days, you can finish your journey by hiring a little electric boat on the Garonne or eating tapas on the decks of the Horizon restaurant barge.



The markets of Toulouse

The city has several covered market halls, such as those in Saint-Cyprien, Carmes and Victor Hugo, as well as open air markets at Cristal and Saint-Aubin, which takes place around the old church. New kid on the block and a must for foodies is the Halles de la Cartoucherie, opened in September 2023.



THE MARATHON IS BACK

The Toulouse Métropole Run Experience Marathon is back on 10 November 2024 - the first event since 2019.







Explore our Grande Randonnée (GR®) hiking trails. From **Toulouse to Luchon**, over the plains, up hills, down into valleys, and all the way to the Pyrenees (**GR®86**); the **Via Garona** along the river, connecting Toulouse to Saint-Bertrand-de-Comminges on the Way of St James (**GR®861**); from Roquesérière to Toulouse, the Haute-Garonne section of the **Conques-Toulouse** trail (**GR®46**); and the **Voie d'Arles**, from Revel to Toulouse, a stage of the Via Tolosana which follows the Canal du Midi through the plains and hills of the Lauragais (**GR®653**). Experienced hikers can take the route from Melles to Oô, with its breathtaking **Pyrenean** panoramas (**GR®10**), and the town of Bagnères-de-Luchon, midway between the Atlantic ocean and the Mediterranean. Or take the **voie du Piémont Pyrenéen** from Portet-d'Aspet to Saint-Bertrand-de-Comminges, following the Way of St James along little-used natural footpaths (**GR®78**).

Follow the bear

Apatura offers mountain hikes following in the footsteps of Pyrenean bears. Your guide is Comminges naturalist Jean-Pierre Daffos, member of the Reseau Ours Brun, a network of observers who keep track of bears in the region. Feeding, reproduction, hibernation, habitat, protection, living alongside humans: get the answers to all your questions about these endangered creatures, now back in our mountains to stay.

The dovecote hike of Cadours

Take a closer look at one of characteristic landmarks in Haute-Garonne: the pigeonnier or dovecote. Leaving from Cadours, over this hilly route you will see the dovecote at la rue des Fossés and its pigeon holes, as well as those of the villages of Grès, Château de Drudas, Lamoth, Cox and Puysségur. A walk through Toulousain countryside with some stunning viewpoints.

Riverbank walk from Gragnague

Set off from the charming little village of Gragnague, join the banks of the river Girou, and pass the remains of an ancient windmill, on this easy 8km walk.



Les chemins de la liberté

During World War II, and at other times, the Pyrenees provided pathways to freedom, allowing refugees to flee fascism and persecution. The memories of this recent past live on in the headstones and ruins left behind. Follow in the footsteps of the resistance fighters, dissidents, escapees and refugees from the Retirada at Saint-Bertrand-de-Comminges, Marignac, Melles, via the col du Portillion, Hospice de France, the port de Balès, the valley of Oueil, towards the Hautes-Pyrenees and as far as Bausen or Bossòst in Spain.



Pony trekking (5 days, 4 nights)

Saddle up with the Cavalcagire equestrian centre for an adventure on horseback over five days and four nights, covering 95km along forest and mountain trails.

Leaving from the village of Saleich, you will cross the valleys of the Arbas and the Ger, as well

as the col de Larrieu and the Paloumère massif. Alternatively, you can ride a donkey with the Ferme d'Oulan Bât. Get ready for starlit nights and superb panoramas.

Shorter treks will be on offer in 2024.

La Boucle du Dagour

Explore the hills of the Lauragais with the Boucle du Dagour, a waymarked trail leaving from the church at Prunet and following a stream that takes you to the lake at Bourg-Saint-Bernard (8km, approx. 2 hours).

Pedal

Get to the heart of the Haute-Garonne on the cycle paths and hiking trails that crisscross the region, from the Trans-Garona to the Canal des deux Mers. On foot or by bike, Haute-Garonne will take you on a journey you won't forget.



Our cycle paths

La Trans-Garona

Leaving from Marquefave, following the Garonne, and ending at the Spanish border by the Val d'Aran, the development of this 130km cycle path has been a major project. The Trans-Garona route is an extension of existing cycle routes (the Val d'Aran network, the crossborder section between Chaum and Marquefave) and winds through picturesque villages like Saint-Martory, Martres-Tolosane, Saint-Bertrand-de-Comminges and Saint-Béat-Lez.

La voie verte Val'Aïgo

This former railway between Bessières and Bressols has been transformed into a 30km cycle path through the Tarn valley. The perfect way to visit the historic town centre of Villemur-sur-Tarn, where you can rent vintage bikes. Stop to picnic at La Magdelaine-sur-Tarn or join the Véloroute Vallée and the Gorges de l'Aveyron.

Signage and sustainable tourism

The council of Haute-Garonne is experimenting with bio-based and compostable signs on the mountain passes at Superbagnères and the Col des Ares. Made in France from hemp and biopolymer (instead of plastic), the signs point to natural sites, cycle tracks and footpaths. A first in France, the new signs are another step towards sustainable tourism.

The Vélorail in Lauragais

The Vélorail du Lauragais at lac de Lenclas, in Saint-Félix-Lauragais, is a 7km cycle path along a former railway, winding through woodlands, wheat fields and sunflowers, with the Pyrenees as a backdrop.

Unusual discovery of the Garonne

In ancient times, crossing a river was done by a ferry, a boat guided by a ferryman, the boatman. For an unusual outing, take a ferry on the Garonne: that of Portet-sur-Garonne, which connects the city center at Parc du Confluent, or that of Fauga to reach the Aouach chapel, south of Muret.



The highest bridges

Pont Neuf means new bridge, but this is actually the oldest in Toulouse, dating back to 1632; visit the pont du Diable in Gensac-sur-Garonne; the iron Eiffel-style bridge at Boussens; the Pont de Bourse over the Mouillonne in Auterive; the magnificent three-arched 18th century bridge at Saint-Martory, listed as a Historic Monument, or the pont de Save in Grenade. As for the Pont du Roi, it will take you all the way to Spain!

Along the Garonne

Follow the Garonne from village to village, stopping at

Fos, Saint-Béat and Fronsac, then Saint-Bertrand-deComminges and Valcabrère (Unesco World Heritage site)
and Labroquère; paddle your canoe as far as Montréjeau,
visit the château de Valmirande and explore Saint-Gaudens,
capital of the Comminges. Admire the magnificent 18th
century three-arch bridge at Saint-Martory; head up to
Martres-Tolosane, famous for its ceramics, Cazères, home to
the Maison Garonne, and Carbonne. From Parc du Confluent,
where the Ariège and Garonne meet, take the ferry at Portetsur-Garonne and wander the wild riverbanks at LacroixFalgarde. This itinerary ends in Toulouse. Visit the Espace
EDF-Bazacle by the river, and take the footbridge from port
Viguerie to the Jardins Raymond VI.

The Canal du Midi in the Lauragais

Stop off at Port Lauragais and the Maison de la Haute-Garonne, head up to Avignonet-Lauragais, Renneville, Villefranche-de-Lauragais, with a detour to Saint-Rome to admire its unusual houses (listed historic monuments). Continue to Montesquieu-Lauragai and the lock at Négra; on to Ayguesvives and the lock at Sanglier, then Nailloux, Montgiscard and the windmills of Montbrun-Lauragais. Then head to Port Sud in Ramonville and Toulouse's Port Saint-Sauveur and the Canal de Brienne.

The climbs of the Tour de France

Some of the finest passes and climbs – or cols – are right here. From Luchon, star of the Tour de France, go to Port de Balès and the Col de Peyresourde. Climb towards Superbagnères and the Col du Portillon, past the Sidonie falls, then on to Saint-Béat and the Col de Menté. Follow the Col du Portet-d'Aspet, the Col des Ares and end your journey at the orientation table at Antichan-de-Frontignes.





Acceuil Chemin de Compostelle accommodation

Maison des Trois Chouettes in Sepx, L'Affenage in Saint-Pé-d'Ardet and La Caubure in Labarthe-Inard now have the Accueil *Chemins de Compostelle* label, awarded to pilgrim accommodation on the Way of St James.

The vineyards at Fronton

From Vacquiers, head to Bouloc, Villeneuve-lès-Bouloc and hilltop village of Castelnau-d'Estrétefonds. On to the Maison des Vins in Fronton at the Château Capdeville, then Villaudric with its spectacular Tarn valley views, then Villematier, Bessières, the forest of Buzet and the pretty village of Paulhac.

Around Saint-Bertrand-de-Comminges and Valcabrère

Visit Saint-Bertrand-de-Comminges and Valcabrère, stopping places on the Way of St James with their own exceptional heritage, the chasm of Lespugue, Saint-Pè-d'Ardet, Sauveterre-de-Comminges, the old springs at Barbazan, then head to Labroquère and the lake at Montréjeau.





THE MEDIEVAL FEAST OF SAINT-JACQUES

In summer, Luchon, Saint-Béat and Saint-Bertrand-de-Comminges mark the medieval feast of Saint-Jacques with a torchlit procession and fire show.

Haute Garone from above

Scale new heights and expand your horizons. From the Pyrenees to the Comminges, from the Lauragais to the Tarn Valley, Haute-Garonne has some truly breath-taking panoramic views

The chapel at the Bout du Puy in Valentine

Between the Comminges and the Pyrenees, near Saint-Gaudens, you'll find the village of Valentine and the Bout du Puy footpath, surrounded by woodlands. Climb up to the chapel of Notre Dame du Bout du Puy and look out from the sanctuary dedicated to the Virgin Mary. The view across the village of Valentine and lac de Sède is spectacular.

The mountain ridges of Superbagnères

Leaving from the resort of Superbagnères, go past the Crabioules and Arnesquens chair lifts and follow the path along the mountain ridges. Right in front of you stands the Pic de Céciré, and an exceptional the view of the Luchonnais summits and the valleys below.

Artigue

Not far from the Spanish border and Bagnères-de-Luchon, the little rural community of Artigue is perched at an altitude of 1,230m above sea level. The hamlet, which sits on the GR®10 hiking trail, has around 30 inhabitants. From its belvedere overlooking the mountains of Superbagnères you'll find the stunning view of the Luchon valley and the Pyrenean peaks.

Le donjon d'Aurignac

Climb the steps to the Count of
Aurignac's castle, a medieval marvel
perched at the top of the village.
From its keep, look out at uninterrupted
views of the foothills of the Pyrenees
and the Gascon hills.





The hilltop village of Montjoire

On the Lauragais side of Haute-Garonne, the hilltop village of Montjoire provides 360-degree views of the Tarn Valley. A beautiful panoramic walk will take you over the fields and up to the crest of the hill..

Saint-Félix-Lauragais

From the hilltop village of Saint-Félix-Lauragais, at the top of a ridge that overlooks the Revel plains, admire the views of the Montagne Noire and the Pyrenees.



The Fête de la Cocagne takes place at Saint-Félix-Lauragais on Easter Sunday, 31 March 2024, with a costume parade, demonstrations of heritage crafts and medieval wares and an ancient traditional challenge, mat de cocagne, where contestants attempt to climb greased pole to reach prizes suspended at the top.



The belitower at Revel

In the main square of the town of Revel stands a fabulous 14th century market hall. It's still in use today; the town's market sets up here each Saturday.

The bell in market hall's tower dates back to 1834 chimes the hour for the town. The Tourist Office organises tours, and visitors can climb the 80 steps to reach the top for the views across the rooftops, the Lauragais, and the Montagne Noire.

Clermont-le-Fort

Perched atop a cliff overlooking the Ariège river, 20km from Toulouse, the little village of Clermont-le-Fort boasts panoramic views of the Pyrenees in the distance and the wild, meandering river below. Hungry? Stop off at Là-Haut Bar & Miam for traditional cuisine in cosy retro décor.

The rooftops of Toulouse

Scale the heights above Toulouse in the Parc de l'Observatoire on the hill at Jolimont, or the rooftop bar of Mama Shelter hotel, or Ma Biche sur le Toit on the roof of Galeries Lafayette department store. Head up to Pech-David with its leisure centre, or climb abord the Téléo, the longest urban cable car in France (3km) which links Oncopole to Paul Sabatier university in just 10 minutes

Orientation tables

You'll find some spectacular viewpoints at the orientation tables around Haute-Garonne. Superbagnères and Bastion des Frontignes at Col des Ares (Antichan-de-Frontignes) in the heart of the Pyreness; the orientation tables at Montréjeau, Saint-Gaudens, Montmaurin, Saint-Martory, Belbèze-en-Comminges on the hill at Pédégas, from the top of the keep at Aurignac or in Martres-Tolosane (the orientation table of Cassagnau). Or find the viewpoint at Castéra in Montesquieu-Volvestre. In the Lauragais, look for those at Calvaire de Cintagabelle, Camont and Avignonet-Lauragais. Finally, there are those in Clermont-le-Fort above the Ariège river or Plateau du Pech in Venerque.





Our traditions and festivals

Haute-Garonne loves fine food and festivities, and our traditional festivals have brought communities together since the dawn of time. Village fêtes, vineyard celebrations, traditional celebrations of the land and the mountains, these festivities are the life and soul of the *département*.

Les fêtes du Brandon

Awarded intangible heritage status by Unesco, the Brandon festival marks the day of St Jean on 21 June, for the summer solstice. This ancestral fire ritual can be experienced in the Central Pyrenees, in Luchon and surrounding villages. The Brandon involves assembling tree trunks which are burned at nightfall. Expect folk music, fire-eaters and traditional horseback guides to form part of the celebrations.

The Fête des Fleurs in Luchon

Luchon en Fleurs takes place in the last week of August. A 120-year-old tradition, the streets of the town come alive with activities, events, entertainers, brass bands, percussionists, a waiters' race, the 'Miss Fleurs' contest, pyrotechnics and a procession of traditional horseback guides. Don't miss the parade with its flower-covered floats and the battle of the flowers – some 400,000 flowers are used over the four days of this colourful, fragrant festival.

The Fête de la Saint-Vidian in Martres-Tolosane

In May, on Trinity Sunday, the Sunday after Pentecost, Martres-Tolosane celebrates the feast day of St Vidian. With its origins in the 8th century crusade between the Christians and Saracens, the festival involves a re-enactment of the battle of St Vidian, costume parades, cavalcades and a procession.




The giant omelette of Bessières

On Easter Monday (1 April 2024) in Bessières, the *Confrérie des Chevaliers de l'omelette géante* (Brotherhood of the Knights of the Giant Omelette) invite you to join them for an unusual meal. No fewer than 15,000 eggs are used to make an omelette in a pan that measures 4m in diameter. There's other entertainment on offer, too.

La Foire aux Chapons in Saint-Julia-de-Gras-Capou

This little Lauragais village, known for producing capon, invites visitors to join villagers in December for a traditional fair. Saint-Julia-de-Gras-Capou unites producers of capon and other specialities, as well as craftspeople, for this popular village festival, one hour outside Toulouse.





La Fête du Pré de la Fadaise

Bourg-Saint-Bernard, to the east of Toulouse, invites you to the Fête du Pré de la Fadaise on Whit Monday. This large, festive event in the Lauragais can trace its origins back over eight centuries to the Albigensian Crusade.

A rural festival with performers, concerts and a village dance. Come along and admire the parade, with its flower-trimmed floats, cavaliers, musicians and fireworks.

La Fête des Candelous in Avignonet-Lauragais

The Fête des Candelous takes place on the night of the first Monday in June, with a candle-lit pilgrimage and religious procession in honour of Notre-Dames-des-Miracles. The festival traces its dark beginnings to the crusades against the Cathars when, in 1242, the Albigensians from Monségur came at nightfall to massacre the members of the inquisition at the town court.

La fête du Papogay

From the end of April to the beginning of May the Fête du Papogay takes over the little town of Rieux-Volvestre. This unique festival centres around the shooting with bows and arrows of a parrot (made of wood and metal) perched at the top of a 45m mast. Whoever makes the parrot fall with an arrow will become the king of the Papogay. The festival takes place over several days, with dancing, costume parades and other festivities.

The transhumance wins intangible heritage status

In 2023, the practice of transhumance, the seasonal herding of animals up to the summer pastures, won Unesco intangible cultural heritage status. Join the transhumance in 2024 as the sheep are taken up to their Pyrenean summer grazing spots in May, from Villeneuve-lès-Bouloc to Château de Launaguet. Come along in June when the herds leave Boutx for l'Escalette or follow the horses of the Cavalcagire stables when they leave from Aspet.

La Fête du Grand Fénétra

The Fête du Grand Fénétra takes place in Toulouse over the last weekend in June or the first weekend in July. Music, dance and song, from France and overseas, are centre stage. Participants wear traditional costumes and take part in a procession, taking over the city's squares with colourful performances and lively dances.

Haute-Garonne cuisine

Haute-Garonne is famous for its hearty cuisine and has a wealth of traditional local dishes and fine produce. Discover our protected appellations, our fine quality produce and our tastiest local specialities.

Our specialities

The duck is king in Haute-Garonne, where foie gras and magret are stars of the menus, but cassoulet and Toulouse sausages get equal billing. In Luchon, there's pétéram, a dish made with tripe, mutton feet and calf's caul, cooked for three hours. Or pistache luchonnaise, a kind of cassoulet, made with mutton and Tarbais beans. Millas from Lauragais, similar to polenta, is made from cereals and can be sweet or savoury, fried or as a galette. Purple garlic from Cadours is grown, and cooked, with great local savoir-faire. Then there are local cheeses, tripou (a tripe-based dish), Occitane omelette or a garlic soup called tourin. For the sweet tooth, Toulouse violets are used in all kinds of creations like candies, ice cream and liqueurs, while Montréjeau's speciality millasson is a flan made with orange flower and lemon.





Toulouse à Table

The Toulouse à Table festival takes place across Haute-Garonne. Buzet-sur-Tarn welcomes around 700 guests for a banquet, while Martres-Tolosane organises a big traditional Comminges meal, and food trucks and gourmet raffles are set up across the area. If a slap-up lunch is your thing, the Château de Villaudric offers lunch in the courtyard. And for sporty types, there's a hearty meal after the trail du Cassoulet race in Verfeil.

Top quality produce requires skill and care, and Haute-Garonne is proud of its producers. Among our appellation d'origine protégée (AOP) (protected designation of origin) products is the purple garlic of Cadours, black pork from Bigorre and the wines of Fronton. Both Pyrenean lamb and Tarbais beans have the status of indication géographique protégée (IGP) (geographic indication protected). Gascon cattle have the 'Label rouge' quality award. Sustainability and quality are at the heart of our agriculture.

Le Fournil Résistance in Saint-Bertrand-de-Comminges

Sourdough bread made with slow fermentation and heritage flours and baked in a traditional woodfire; la Louise, la Colette, La Frida – all the breads are named after women in tribute to the feminist fight. This unusual bakery, created by Tulip Santène, offers workshops where you can learn the art of traditional baking.

Curdling, draining, shaping, salting, ripening - take part in a cheesemaking workshop where the farmers share their savoir-faire.

Ferme de Couledoux in Boutx-Couledoux, at the foot of the Cagire mountain. Find out about the Tarentaise dairy cows, and how mountain cheeses are made.

See the whole process, from the early morning milking to the creation of a traditional tomme cheese. Find out about acidification processes used for fromage blanc and other products and visit the cellars and the rest of the farm.

With ceramics, blue woad dyes, stained glass and marquetry, it's clear that arts and crafts are alive and well in Haute-Garonne, where ancient skills are blended with innovative creative initiatives.

Ceramics in Martres-Tolosane

Martres-Tolosane, renowned for its characteristic ceramics, has a unique place in French heritage. Immersion in tin-based enamel gives the clay its opaque whiteness, while firing at 980°c is done using the ancient *grand feu* (big fire) technique. Visit the Musée de la Faïence (Ceramics Museum) in the old town – recently named one of France's Small Towns of Character.

The marble quarries at Saint-Béat

Saint-Béat is known for the marble cut from its Jurassic limestone rocks; its quarries have been in operation since antiquity. Marble from Saint-Béat can be found in the Château de Versailles and the Louvre, among others.

FESTIVAL DE LA SCULPTURE ET DU MARBRE IN SAINT-BÉAT

For three weeks in July, Saint-Béat and its surroundings play host to the Festival of Sculpture and Marble. For 20 years, this event has unlocked the secrets of marble. Did you know there are several varieties? Pure white, turquoise, green, as well as black, yellow and red. Events take place from 6 to 27 July 2024.



Blue par Nature and Terre de Pastel

To celebrate its 10th anniversary in 2023, Bleu par Nature, part of the Terre de Pastel group, announced the creation of a seven-acre domain dedicated to the woad (pastel) plant. Set to open in spring 2025, it will include a 5-star hotel and spa, gastronomic restaurant run by Toulouse's Michelin-starred chef Guillaume Momboisse, a training centre and cultivation land for these precious plants.

The group planted the first woad fields in Labège a decade ago, where it opened its first spa, museum and craft boutique offering workshops to learn how to use the blue dye – there are also shops in Toulouse and Albi. Woad, or pastel, is on Unesco's intangible cultural heritage list, and comes from a native Occitan plant (Latin name Isatis tinctoria L.,) known as the dyer's plant. Its flowers are yellow, but its leaves are used to create a blue pigment found in a large range of beauty products, cosmetics, as well as clothing and homeware.



Stained glass in Montréjeau

The Atelier Vitrail de Mont-Royal in Montréjeau designs, makes and restores stained glass. Maryline Delous, the founder, and Francisco Grivalja work with private individuals, professionals, public authorities, cultural spaces, châteaux and hotels.

Collaborating with a network of craftspeople in the region, from artistic ironwork to marble sculpture, they also produce Art Nouveau and Art Deco, contemporary and classic pieces.

Open seven days a week, all year round, Maison de la Haute-Garonne in Port-Lauragais sells tasty local delicacies as well as crafts made by local artists: pottery, jewellery, woad-dyed textiles, and pieces by the cabinetmakers of Revel and the ceramicists of Martres-Tolosane.

Furniture making in Revel

Since the 19th century, the medieval bastide town of Revel has been renowned as the capital of furniture making and marquetry. Thanks to its excellent craftspeople, cabinetmakers, engravers, ironmongers, rug makers and other decorative artists, the town has earned special Ville et Métiers d'Art status. Uncover the secrets of heritage crafts at the Musée du Bois et de la Marqueterie (MUB), a centre for contemporary art.

Revel has also been recognised as a Centre for Rural Excellence, and it continues to preserve artisan skills through its specialist arts and crafts school, Institute des Métiers d'Art & l'Artisanat (Imara), and its professional lycée dedicated to crafts, woodwork and furniture making, as well as its active creative crafts communities.

Pierre Saint-Martin

The carillon bells of Aspet

Pierre Saint-Martin has something of an unusual iob. He is the official carillonneur at the church of St Martin in Aspet, in the Pyrenees, where he plays the beautiful 16-bell carillon, the pride of Aspet. A little 14th century door leading him to his workplace, and the first bell in the tower was founded in Aspet in 1823, and the largest, which has been named Martine, weighs a tonne. Pierre Saint-Martin plays the music of André Bouéry, 19th century musician and poet who created an original repertoire especially for this unusual instrument (Chansons gasconnes du sonneur d'Aspet, or Gascon songs for the ringer of Aspet, 1872). You can hear the carillon ring out in the streets of Aspet on market days (Wednesdays and Saturdays), at midday, on Sundays for mass, and every evening in December during the Christmas period.

Our four ski resorts

Le Mourtis

Family-friendly Le Mourtis in Boutx has 20 slopes, 23km of skiable pistes and 10 ski lifts. Come for trails through the forest, dogsledding with Le Souffle Nordique, pony trekking with the Equi'Boutx equestrian centre, or Nordic walking with Pyrénees Liberté.



Luchon-Superbagnères

With 30km of slopes, 28 pistes, 14 lifts, and a cable car linking the town to the resort, Luchon-Superbagnères will wow you with its mountain ridges and altitude restaurant, complete with 360° views.



The new panoramic cable car

Launched in 2023, the new express cable car service at Luchon–Superbagnères, with 58 10–person cars, takes eight minutes to rise 1200m from the town of Luchon to the resort's summit. The new valley–to–summit service makes it easier to reach the slopes and hiking trails.

Peyragudes

A ski resort spread over two sides of the mountain, Agudes and Peyrasourde, there are 51 slopes, 18 lifts, and 60km of pistes.
Peyragudes is accessible via the Skyvall cable car, linking Loudenvielle and the foot of the slopes at Peyresourde. The resort is equipped to offer disabled skiing.

The view from the terrace across the cirque d'Espingo and the lake is spectacular. If you want a challenge, carry on towards lac Saussat and lac du Portillon.


Lac de Badech
